1. SUMMARY OF REPORT

SUMMARY:

Background

The Ministry of Natural Resources is the Executing Agency for the Forest Carbon Partnership Facility REDD+ Project. The Ministry has put in place robust institutional arrangements to support transparency, accountability and inclusivity in the project's execution. The Ministry continues to work in close association with the Guyana Forestry Commission, which has oversight for implementing and sustaining key technical aspects of REDD+ activities in Guyana to ensure the success of the FCPF Support for REDD+ Readiness Process, as well as all relevant stakeholders.

Summary of Progress

Project Execution Unit

- Additions to the existing Project Execution Unit were made during the reporting period.
- The PEU hired an Accounting/Administrative Officer in April 2017 and a Procurement Specialist in June, 2017.
- TOR for a Public Relations Officer was prepared and No Objection has been given by the IDB. The Ministry has
 advertised in local newspapers and the closing date for CVs was June 30, 2017. Interviews and selection of candidate
 will follow.

Project Steering Committee

- The Project Steering Committee formed during this reporting period comprises representatives from Ministry of Natural Resources, National Toshaos Council, North Rupununi District Development Board, National Steering Committee of Community Forestry Organizations, Amerindian Peoples Association, Faculty of Earth and Environmental Sciences-University of Guyana, Guyana Forestry Commission, Office of Climate Change, Forest Producers Association, Transparency International Guyana, Red Thread and Caribbean Youth Environment Network.
- The PSC has had three meetings to date; 1st PSC meeting 19th & 20th January, 2017, GFC Boardroom, 2nd PSC meeting 3rd March, 2017, GFC Boardroom, 3rd PSC meeting 20th April, 2017, Regency Hotel and is scheduled to meet again on the 20th July, 2017.

2. MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS AND RESULTS DURING THE PERIOD

These activities were non-FCPF financed.

Monitoring Reporting Verification System (MRVs) for the period January to July 2017

The GFC commenced work on exploration of options for continued forest change monitoring under a "non-REDD+ payment" scenario. The first option considered was the use of freely available Landsat 30m resolution imagery. Using this option meant that the GFC had to assess the resources available and determine the best way to go about tracking change and what could be mapped. Based on the quality of the imagery available, it was decided that it would be best to only map deforestation areas and Shifting Agriculture areas that were 1 ha and above.

The imagery was used to assess forest change for the assessment year 2015. Preliminary results have indicated that with Landsat imagery even though it tends to overestimate large areas of change, it is still possible that it may miss those areas that are around 1ha, especially since with Landsat imagery the mapping scale is increased from 1:8,000 to 1:15,000 to accommodate for the coarser pixel size. Further, for the period, there was no supplementary sources of imagery used; i.e. solely Landsat 7 & 8 imagery were used. This lends to the high possibility of areas going undetected since it is a known fact that Guyana is very cloudy and also that Landsat 7 has issues with missing data. Field data collection was conducted in order to continue to update forest biomass and carbon stock data.

- The formation of the Project Steering Committee. It comprises representatives from Ministry of Natural Resources, National Toshaos
 Council, North Rupununi District Development Board, National Steering Committee of Community Forestry Organizations, Amerindian
 Peoples Association, Faculty of Earth and Environmental Sciences-University of Guyana, Guyana Forestry Commission, Office of Climate
 Change, Forest Producers Association, Transparency International Guyana, Red Thread and Caribbean Youth Environment Network.
- 2. The first NRWG Meeting was held the 20th April, 2017. It was attended by stakeholders from all sectors, inclusive of the indigenous peoples, academia, civil society, NGOs and private sector. Approximately 30 representatives attended the first NRWG meeting.
- 3. In recognition of the importance of indigenous involvement in the Guyana –FCPF REDD+ Readiness Process, the Project Execution Unit (PEU) in collaboration with the Project Steering Committee held Consultation Sessions within Indigenous communities during the period May-June, 2017, in the North and Central Rupununi. This will be continued for the year. These sessions were aimed at enhancing stakeholder's understanding of the FCPF REDD+ Readiness Process. Presentations were done on the FCPF Project along with a project update. There were approximately 100 representatives from various indigenous communities in region 9.

The Ministry of Natural Resources is aware of the importance of ensuring increasingly greater impact of stakeholder engagement processes, and will actively continue field programmes that will also include other forest dependent communities.

Examples of stakeholder engagement platforms in country which meet regularly to discuss and provide inputs to the REDD+ readiness process (FCPF M&E Framework 3.2.a.):

Frequency: Monthly

FCPF Project Steering Committee

Began its duties in January, 2017. The primary function of the Project Steering Committee is to oversee the development and implementation of REDD+ readiness activities detailed in the Technical Cooperation Agreement for the project: Support for REDD+ Readiness Process in Guyana. The Steering Committee will monitor and review the status of the components of the project, as well as provide oversight of project deliverables.

Frequency: Quarterly

Green Multi-Stakeholder Steering Committee

In recognition of the need for an inclusive and participatory approach to national development His Excellency President David Granger has commissioned the Green Multi-Stakeholder Steering Committee (GMSSC). The GMSSC serves as an integral stakeholder mechanism for the elaboration and monitoring of the Green State Development Strategy (GSDS) while addressing matters related to the agreement between Norway and Guyana.

The GMSSC is mandated to provide guidance on plans and proposals related to the development of the GSDS along with implementation activities which may include actions from under the Low Carbon Development Strategy (LCDS). The committee will also oversee the progress under all national Agreements especially the Memorandum of Understanding between Guyana-Norway. Finally it provides guidance and oversight in the planning and execution of ongoing national stakeholder consultations to mitigate the need and use of ad hoc consultative platforms. Representatives come from the private sector, public sector, the opposition and civil society actors.

Frequency: Quarterly

MRVS Steering Committee

Convened to oversee the development and implementation of Guyana's Monitoring Reporting & Verification System. The Steering Committee will monitor and review the status of various aspects of the MRVS development, as well as provide oversight of project deliverables. As a related Objective, the Steering Committee will be responsible for providing a mechanism to support the boarder objectives of land use and land management (including within forest areas), in Guyana.

EITI

The overall goal of EITI to achieve good governance of natural resources will aid in Guyana's compliance with REDD+ standards. The Cooperative Republic of Guyana is not a member of EITI as of 15th March, 2017. However, it must be praised for intensifying its efforts, in recent years, to satisfy EITI candidate sign-up requirements. The country announced its commitment to implement the EITI since May 2010. Guyana and EITI signed a Memorandum of Understanding in 2012, per which Guyana will be assisted with its preparation of EITI candidacy. Progress for this reporting period are as follows;

- 1. A National Coordinator and a Deputy Coordinator have been appointed.
- 2. A Multi-Stakeholder Group (MSG) was formally established in February 2017, with a total of twelve members. Each of the three sectors nominated four (4) members and each member has an alternate. The TOR and workplan have been finalized.
- 3. The MNR in collaboration with the MSG are reviewing the initial candidate application.
- 4. Barring any unforeseen obstacles, The Cooperative Republic of Guyana can become an EITI candidate before the end of 2017.

EUFLEGT

In March 2012, the Governments of Guyana and the European Union announced the decision to enter into formal negotiations on a Voluntary Partnership Agreement (VPA). The VPA is the mechanism under FLEGT that outlined the ambits of the trade and forest governance agreement that Guyana and the EU jointly agree to. There have been four negotiation meetings to date between the EU and the GoG: December 2012, July 2013, April 2015 and March 2016 The 5th Negotiation is to be held in Brussels in 2017. Progress for this reporting period are as follows;

- The 4th round of national consultation was conducted on January 30th February 16th 2017 with three teams comprising members of the National Technical Working Group (NTWG), FLEGT Secretariat, and representatives from the Guyana Revenue Authority (GRA) and National Insurance Scheme (NIS). A total of twenty four (24) one day sessions were conducted with the aims of providing a detailed update of the FLEGT process in Guyana, and fostering open-dialogue on the newer versions of Annexes II, Annex V and Annex VIII. These sessions used a more focused approach; targeting stakeholders directly involved in logging and discussing how the VPA addresses or creates a platform for discussing key issues relating to Land Tenure, Stakeholder obligations, transparency and communication, inter-agency collaboration, and independent auditing. A total of 786 persons participated during the consultation, with representation from more than 154 different stakeholder groups (primarily comprising Amerindian villages/communities and logging associations).
- The NTWG has begun using Radio Lethem (95.1) and Radio Paiwomak in Annai (97.1) to stream live consultation sessions through the airwaves, and provide regular updates of the VPA process.
- All completed Annexes as well as the stakeholder feedback matrix are being updated based on the information received during the latest round of consultations.

Green State Development Strategy

The framework document for Guyana's development along a 'green' pathway has been finalised. The document, which is titled 'Framework of the Guyana Green State Development Strategy and Financing Mechanisms' is intended to provide guidance on the prioritised areas to be developed in the Green State Development Strategy (GSDS). It lays out the elements to be examined and consulted on during the course of the development of that policy document.

Notably, this document represents a roadmap for Guyana's development along a reduced emissions pathway and builds on the successes of the Low Carbon Development Strategy (LCDS) and several other national documents such as the Nationally Determined Contributions, Climate Resilience Strategy Action Plan (CRSAP), Draft National Energy Policy, and National Adaptation Strategy for the Agriculture Sector (2009 -2018).

Nationwide consultations and stakeholders' feedback for 2017 have begun. These will guide the development of the seven major themes of the strategy. These include: green inclusive, structural transformation; sustainable management of natural resources; transition towards renewable energy; resilient infrastructure and spatial development; human development and wellbeing; governance and institutional foundations; and international cooperation, trade and investment.

4. ISSUES, CHALLENGES AND RISKS

- 1. Administrative The Ministry of Natural Resources is now the executing agency for the Forest Carbon Partnership Facility Project in Guyana, leaving the Guyana Forestry Commission as the implementing agency for REDD+ activities. The Ministry and the Guyana Forestry Commission continue to work closely to plan and execute REDD+ activities. However, given the change of executing agency there have been some delays in the execution of project activities.
- 2. **Perceptions of Stakeholder Groups** The PEU during this reporting period highlighted challenges directly related to the stakeholder consultation/inception workshop. The FCPF process was a continuation of the LCDS (a national initiative)
 - The FCPF process was primarily focused on Indigenous people
 - The lack of trust among all stakeholder groups
 - Tying the FCPF process to finding resolution of indigenous land tenure, exclusive rights to natural resource use
 - Expectations that available funds are exclusively for the benefit of Indigenous communities
- These perceptions are being continuously clarified by the Project Execution Unit through stakeholder engagement.

5. MAIN LESSONS LEARNED

1. Stakeholder Participation is key to the FCPF process

- The need for a clear communications strategy and the dissemination of information
- To ensure that all forest dependent communities take ownership of the FCPF process for its success
- The importance of human capacity building to ensure the sustaining of community development activities beyond the life of the project.
- The need to ensure the integration of the FCPF outcomes into Guyana's Green Economy National Policy strategy
