Sudan's REDD+ Readiness process made significant progress in respect to develop the REDD+ mechanism in forestry sector, the key activities during reporting period include:

- A total of 11165(7332males, 3833female) individuals attended consultations in various REDD+ topics such safeguards, REDD+ knowledge, FGRM, Benefit Sharing and role of women in forestry sector. Out of the total3151 (1513 males, 839 Females) individuals were attended consultations on REDD+ topics during the reporting period.
- Sudan's R-package was endorsed in March 2019 at the PC 27th meeting in Washington DC. R-Package's self-assessment process was conducted during the period 23 December 2018 to 7 January 2019. In total, 74 representatives of nine stakeholder groups have participated in the self-assessment process, of which 43 percent werewomen. Participants include PMU staff, state focal points, members of the Technical Advisory Committee, the Steering Committee, and the Technical Working Groups, as well as representatives from 10 civil society organizations and two development partners.

- As Part of Sudan's REDD+ institutional arrangements, Feedback Grievances Redress Mechanism (FGRM) was developed in line with FCPF RAF guidance.
- FGRM validation workshop was conducted on the 27th September 2018, the specific objectives of the workshop were (i) Sharing the study and its results with the project stakeholders (ii)Providing a platform for the discussion of developing Feedback and Grievance Redress Mechanism for Sudan's REDD+ programme issues. The Workshop was attended by 45 persons out of whom 64 % were males and 36% were females. The participants involved a wide spectrum of representation including staff of Forests National Corporation (FNC); Research Institutions; Educational Institutions; Higher Council for Environment and Natural Resources; Private sector; Related Ministries (Ministries of Agriculture and Forests, Minerals, Oil and Gas, Animal Resources; Department of Wildlife); Sudanese Agricultural Council; CSOs; and interested researchers and environmental activists.
- The steering committee met on the 17th January 2019, the meeting includes high level and political members representing institutions related to REDD+. The meeting chaired by the Minister of Agriculture and Forests.
- Sudan's Program Management Unit (PMU) organized monthly meeting to oversee the implementation of readiness activities.
- SESA validation workshop was conducted on the 10th August 2018. The workshop was attended by 54 participants (34 Males, 20 Females) representing relevant REDD+ institutions in Sudan.
- REDD+ Sudan organized Regional workshop during the period 16 18 September 2018, in Khartoum, at The Grand Holiday Villa Hotel. A total of 100 participants attended the workshop. They represented different REDD+ countries (Kenya, Ethiopia, Ghana, Nigeria, Côte d'Ivoire, Uganda, and South Africa in addition to Sudan participants). The 18 REDD+ focal points at states, line ministries, Gum Arabic producer association, Civil Society Organization and Indigenous People organization, analytical studies consultants, and private sector also participated in this regional workshop. The workshop's main objectives were(i) to share the lessons learnt and exchange the experiences, with countries in the region, on designing and implementing REDD+ national strategies and emissions reduction programs and drive applicable lessons for Sudan and (ii) to share experiences from the Capacity Building Program for Indigenous People (IPs) in REDD+ readiness in Africa (MPDIO & PACJA) funded by the FCPF.
- During the reporting period, the readiness capacity-building support program covered 10 PMU staff. The program covered areas such as Monitoring and Evaluation, Procurement, communication and financial management.
- The World Bank conducted a technical backstopping mission to monitor progress and provide technical support to the management arrangements in September 2018.
- During September and October 2018, awareness and consultation workshops about REDD+ Knowledge and benefits were conducted in Red Sea, River Nile and Northern states, a total of 215 were participated (160males, 55 females) from relevant stakeholders.
- The Sudan REDD+ PMU organised a three-day training (31 July 2 August 2018)on Transformational leadership and Emotional Intelligence to provide insights on how to build emotionally Intelligent Leaders for outstanding performance under the REDD+ Project. The workshop was attended by members of the Non-Governmental Organisations engaged in the forestry and environmental issues, Ministry of Environment, Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry, Ministry of Animals, Oil and Gas, Forest National Corporation, Free Lance Consultant, wildlife authority and REDD+ Sudan Staff. A total of 36 members participated of whom 20 were males and 16 females.
- More than 5000 publications about REDD+ knowledge and visibility package for the REDD+ have been designed and distributed (caps, mugs, pens, notebooks, mouse pad, key tag, and calendar).
- The new website for REDD+ Sudan was launched and the informationupdated periodically: www.reddplussd.org
- REDD+ Sudan implemented capacitybuilding support through exchange visit to Ethiopia between the period of 2-8 September 2018, in which 16 representatives participated including members fromFNC, Ministry of Animal Resources, Wildlife Administration, Ministry of Agriculture, Technical NFI officers (White Nile andNorth Kordofan), Ministry of Finance, IFAD / FNC and TAC members. The objective of the visitwas to share experiences between Sudan and Ethiopia in mainstreaming REDD+ in the development policy agenda, land tenure, land use planning, benefit sharing, FRL/ERL, NFI and involvement of key stakeholders with focus on the youth and gender in forest landscape management.
- Regarding the contribution of the gum Arabic belt in the mitigation of climate change, reducing emissions, economic values and social importance, REDD+ Sudan organized gum Arabic workshop in Al-Obeid, the capital of North Kordofan State in February 7- 8, 2019. The workshop was attended by 153 participants (49 females and 104 males), representing stakeholders, and executive entities, producers of gum Arabic, gum Arabic associations, gum Arabic Research Centre in North of Kordofan, University of Kordofan, University of Khartoum, Agricultural Research

- Corporation and civil leaders. The workshop was honored by the attention and the speech presented by the Governor of North Kordofan State.
- REDD+ Sudan organized Mangrove forests workshop duringtheperiodsof 21-24 January 2019 in the Red Sea State. The main objectives of the workshop wereto identify the current status of the Mangrove trees and its ecosystem on Sudan Red Sea coastal areas, their role in mitigating climatic change and to highlight their environmental and social importance, and the way forward focusing on national determine contribution based to attract fund for blue carbon. A total of 156 participants (52 females and 104 males) were participated.
- Between the periods of 25th February 3rd March 2019, REDD+ Sudan organized a training for the States' focal points in Dubai. The training title "advanced project management to build capacities for future REDD+ implementation". 26 members were participating in the training.
- The PMU organized twomeetings withthe internship program's researchers to follow up the progress on their research and studies on November 2018& April 2019.
- As part of developing gender mainstreaming strategy, an assignment which is undertaken by the Sudanese Environment Conservation Society (SECS); a National NGO, SECS conducted 11 awareness campaigns in 7 states during February and March 2019 reaching about 2127 members (1078 males, 585 females and 464 children). In addition to 5 forums with participation of 290 members (187 males and 103 females). www.secs.org.sd/redd
- SECS prepared the first part of the gender mainstreaming strategy, which is contains the first draft of both the Needs Assessment and the Stakeholders Analysis.
- SECS produced adocumentary film depicting the role of women in forestry sector.
- FAO continued disseminating visibility materials such as pens and mugs. A reprint of three FAO publications has been commissioned by the project and (partially) distributed to stakeholders: (i) "From reference levels to results reporting: REDD+ under the UNFCCC 2018 update" (80 copies); (ii) Voluntary Guidelines on Wildfire Monitoring" (Arabic, 100 copies); (iii) "Community-Based Wildfire Management" (100 copies).
- FAO and FNC completed the main phase of the data-collection of the National Forest Inventory (NFI).
- FAO continued efforts for strengthening the Remote Sensing Unit within FNC through on-the-job-training. FAO recruited a National Consultant for Remote Sensing who is based at FNC.
- FAO procured very high resolution images (VHRI) to support validation of results and activity data generation.
- FAO is working to consult the remote sensing authority to develop activity data for FRL/ERL
- FAO fielded on the 28thOctober a scoping mission from FAO HQ to kick-start wildfire activities. FAO and FNC organized a national stakeholder workshop with 40 participants from the federal and state levels.
- FAO hired a national consultant to develop a strategic report for fire management in the context of reducing emissions from burned forests and strengthen the capacity of the FNC staff.
- Between the periods of January and February, a series of workshops were held by FAO, FNC and RSSA in five states to raise awareness on modern approaches of fire management and monitoring. The workshops intended as well to get a better understanding of traditional (community-based) fire management strategies and practices, and to understand drivers of wildfire. In total, 250 representatives from various government institutions and communities attended the workshops and the discussion groups.
- FAO financed the participation of the FNC Focal Point for Wildfire at the "Workshop of the Working Group on Forest fires Silva Mediterrana, Leon (Spain), 19-23 November 2018", and the annual meeting of the Near East Network on Wild land Forest Fire (NENFIRE) in Lebanon (26-28 February 2019). An article titled "Managing wildfires in Sudan using satellite remote sensing data" was published in the February issue of the UNREDD Newsletter. - According to FAO report, the original plan for submitting the FREL in January 2019 could not be met and FAO recommended FNC to postpone the submission of the FREL to January 2020. This recommendation was based on the following considerations; (i) Ensure adequate national capacity is built and well-trained team is in place to conduct the required reviews by UNFCCC Secretariat, as well as to autonomously develop other (sub-) national FRELs; (ii) Ensure reliable country-specific data is generated to support the credibility of the methodology applied by the country for FREL construction.
- FAO conducted the second and third FREL national workshop in October 2018 and February 2019 respectively with participation of relevant stakeholders.
- In November 2018, FAO fielded a scoping mission with the aim to assess institutional arrangements, conduct a gap analysis and training needs assessment. In the framework of this mission, a stakeholder meeting with approximately 45 participants was organized.

- On the 11th February 2019, REDD+ Sudan supported Ozone Layer Protection Organization which is local NGO to conduct Mangrove forests forum to support the information and data about mangrove. A total of 90 members were participated (50 females, 40 males).Participants include research corporation, universities, government institutions and NGOs.
- Result framework and activities data base were updated on regular basis.
- One steering committee meeting, 6 FREL task force meeting and 9 PMU meetings were conducted during the reporting period.
- The PMU attended World Bank country office monthly meeting to provide an update on Readiness implementation activities.
- World Resource Institute (WRI) submitted a draft technical Report on Public and private financing options in Sudan and aresource mobilization plan for further investment in FLR on 30 April, 2019, as part of the "Forest Landscape Restoration for Sudan REDD+ Programme" project.
- During25-26June 2019, WRI organized roundtable discussion with participation of government officials, non-profits, universities and private sector representatives from Sudan and Ethiopia. Participants discussed the best practices in market-led forest landscape restoration (FLR), with a focus on gum Arabic production. The roundtable took place in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.
- UNIQUEorganization consulted to carry out the study of the private sector engagement; and they submitted an inception report for the Private Sector Engagement in Reforestation Initiatives study.
- The TOR for the National REDD+ strategy update is developed and reviewed.
- The technical and financial proposal for SESA update is received and reviewed.
- Mining study's inception report received and the consultation process with relevant stakeholders is ongoing.
- Inception report on Pilot study and information tracking system is received.
- A benefit sharing mechanism has been drafted and validated to guide the process for sharing potential benefits from the REDD+ program. This process has been inclusive and has required robust consultations at the local, district, regional and national levels

2. What were the main REDD+ readiness-related challenges and/or problems during the last year?

- For example, lack of engagement from key stakeholders, political barriers, limited funding
 - The political instability and the volatile security situation in Sudan have hindered the implementation of the activities and have stopped the transfer of fundto Sudan temporarily, until the government reinstated.

3. What are the main REDD+ readiness-related <u>activities</u> that you hope to deliver, and <u>achievements</u> anticipated during the <u>next year</u>?

- For example, hold x consultation events, submission of R-Package to the PC, finalisation of SIS, commission research into REDD+ strategy options
- Continue strengthening the technical and institutional capacities of the REDD+ management arrangements particularly at the state level, in areas such as program management (managerial capacity) and communication skills. Technical skills in areas related to REDD+ implementation such as FREL/FRL, NFMS, ESMF, FGRM, benefit-sharing as well as financial management systems of development partners and skills for coordinating the implementation of the national REDD+ strategy, including emission reduction programs.
- Continue to translate all documents to Arabic to support the stakeholders to understand the implementation of REDD+.
- Implementation of the second round of the REDD+ state forums and the campaigns as part of the gender mainstreaming strategy.
- Finalize the designing and development of the FREL/FRL and then to bevalidated and submitted to the UNFCCC for technical assessment before January 2020.

- The initiation of the information system for multiple benefits, other impacts, governance and safeguards by August 2019
- Complete the development of NFMS/MRV, including the NFI, institutional arrangements by October 2019.
- Continue to support civil society organization platforms at the national and state levels to improve stakeholder's engagement in REDD+ process.
- Complete the procurement of IT equipment and office remodelling to carry out additional fund activities.
- Finalize the Forest Landscapes Restoration Assessment & National Strategy Report
- Finalization of Gender Mainstreaming Strategy and Comprehensive Workshop Series.
- Finalize the Private Sector Engagement in Reforestation Initiatives Report.
- Completion of mining study.
- Completion of SESA Enhancement.
- Conduct South-South Exchange Learning and sharing experiences & lessons.
- Design National REDD+ Pilot Program.
- Continue enhancing GHG Inventory and remote sensing.
- Finalization of National REDD+ strategy.

Given FAO's comparative advantage and experience in working with other REDD+ countries on the NFMS, the FNC and FAO-Sudan signed an agreement to develop Sudan's NFMS. FAO provided technical support to FNC to strengthen its capacity in remote sensing and in the development of change assessment maps. The NFI field works covered almost all accessible Sampling Units. Out of a total of 705 Sampling Units (SU), 535 SU could be covered by the field crews, 132 SU were inaccessible due to security concerns.In order to fill this gap, FAO and FNC initiated an intensification of the field campaign covering an additional 263 SU and till now 252 SU were finalized, located in forest and shrub lands and in accessible areas, mainly in the southern parts of the country. The preparation of the NFMS is planned to be completed by October 2019.
