Session 2a. Readiness Assessment Framework: Setting the stage for Readiness Package Reviews

The submission and review of the Readiness-Package (R-Package) is a major milestone in a REDD Country's readiness preparation process. The FMT presents key elements of the FCPF's Readiness Assessment Framework and the review process to assess REDD Countries' progress, ahead of Countries' presentations of their R-Packages for PC consideration and endorsement in Session 2b-f. The Readiness Assessment Framework was adopted by the PC in March 2013 (PC14). Further guidance on the R-Package [review](#) process was provided by the PC in November 2014 (PC18).

Sessions 2b-f. Readiness Packages

As per the FCPF Charter, a REDD Country Participant may submit an R-Package based on progress in implementing its Readiness Preparation Proposal (R-PP), and request the PC to endorse it. The format and process for Readiness Packages are laid out in the Readiness Package Assessment Framework and the PC14 Resolution that adopted the framework. Nepal, Ghana, Republic of Congo, and Chile have each submitted an R-Package for endorsement at the PC22 meeting.

Background documentation: Nepal, Ghana, Republic of Congo, Vietnam, and Chile's Readiness Packages and the respective Technical Advisory Panel (TAP) reviews are available on the PC22 webpage.

Expected PC action: The PC may adopt a resolution which endorses Nepal, Ghana, Republic of Congo, Vietnam, and Chile's Readiness Packages respectively and: 1) recognizes the readiness progress achieved to date, and 2) lists strengths and areas for improvement.

Sessions 3a-d. Mid-Term Progress Reports with requests for additional funding

Cambodia, Madagascar, and Nicaragua will present their Mid-Term Progress Reports on implementation of their FCPF grants, and their requests for additional readiness funding of up to US\$5 million. The World Bank and United Nations Development Program, in their capacity as Delivery Partners to each of these Countries, will also present their assessment of the progress achieved so far.

Background documents: Cambodia, Madagascar, and Nicaragua's Progress Reports and requests for additional funding are available on the PC22 webpage.

Expected PC action: The PC may adopt a resolution for each Country, allocating additional funding.

Session 5. Second Evaluation of the FCPF

As per the FCPF Monitoring and Evaluation Framework endorsed by the PC, a second FCPF evaluation was mandated for 2015 and is currently underway. The final Second FCPF Evaluation Report is expected on September 19, 2016. The session will include an update by co-chairs of the evaluation Oversight Committee including OC decision on report endorsement (*expected in week of September 19, 2016*), and a presentation of key findings and recommendations as included in the final report by the Indufor consultants who are conducting the evaluation.

Background documentation: Update presentations on the evaluation will be available on the PC22 webpage. In addition the chapter on evaluation conclusions and recommendations (and translation in Spanish and French) will also be made available in time for the meeting.

Expected PC action: Feedback on next steps on evaluation findings and recommendations,

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Session 2. Update on progress, and presentation of FY16 Annual Report

As per the FCPF Charter, the PC shall report to the PA at each Annual meeting on the decisions made by the PC and, where appropriate, other issues discussed by the PC. It is anticipated that the PC22 Co-chairs will defer to the FMT to provide this report, as well as to report on other progress made in the FCPF more broadly. As such, the FMT will present the Fiscal Year 2016 annual report which covers July 1, 2015 – June 30, 2016, as well as specific progress made since PC21 in May 2016.

Session 6a-d. Knowledge Sharing Sessions

Session 1: REDD+ Benefit Sharing experiences in Ghana, Mexico and Peru

During this session Fabiola Navarrete from Mexico, Kenneth Peralta from Peru, and Roselyn Adjei from Ghana will showcase their country experience on the value and successes in designing, demonstrating and integrating livelihood enhancing incentives for REDD+ frameworks to catalyse long-term engagement of communities to reduce deforestation and forest degradation, this as part of the effort of the REDD+ Benefit Sharing Project implemented with support of IUCN and local partners. The panel will be facilitated by George Akwah from IUCN.

This session has been organized in cooperation with IUCN.

Session 2: Lessons learned from creating Forest Reference Levels for UNFCCC

Forest Reference Levels are critical to REDD+ because they provide the benchmark against which countries measure results of REDD+ implementation. Several countries have submitted reference levels to the UNFCCC and the FCPF, however reference levels are still a learning-by-doing process, generating valuable lessons for REDD+ countries, donors, and technical assessors.

On the panel, Josephina Braga from the World Wildlife Fund will present lessons and best practices on reference levels collected from a workshop held in May, 2016 by Environmental Defense Fund, the International Union for the Conservation of Nature, The Nature Conservancy, Union for Concerned Scientists and World Wildlife Fund. This workshop provided an unprecedented convening of experts that were involved in creating forest reference levels as well as those that served as technical assessors of reference levels for the UNFCCC. Ghislain Hippolyte Sabin Guendehou from Benin will elaborate on the lessons he took away from the workshop as a technical assessor of reference levels for the UNFCCC. Vu Tan Phuong from Vietnam and Angelo Sartori from Chile will discuss the process and challenges involved in creating REDD+ reference levels from their countries' experience. Finally, Alex Lotsch from the FCPF Facility Management Team will discuss the implications of this work for donor and multilateral development entities. The panel will be moderated by Duncan Marsh from The Nature Conservancy.

This session has been organized in cooperation with Environmental Defense Fund, the International Union for the Conservation of Nature, The Nature Conservancy, Union for Concerned Scientists and World Wildlife Fund.

Session 3: Sharing lessons on ER Program development and review for the FCPF Carbon Fund

During this session representatives from a number of REDD+ countries that have advanced to submission of their ER Program Documents (ERPD) to the FCPF Carbon Fund will share lessons and experiences from ERPD development including the subsequent review process through the Carbon Fund. Speakers will discuss challenges they experienced in conceptual and methodological design of ER programs, with validation of program approaches at the national level as well as during the formal review process of the Carbon Fund. This session will be moderated in a fast-paced talk-show format.

Session 4: Gathering input to the FCPF's knowledge strategy and work program for FY17 & beyond

The objective of this session is to gather input on the REDD+ related knowledge needs of countries and observers. Input received will inform the design and dissemination of knowledge products and services of the FCPF during FY17 and beyond. During this session, results from a short survey undertaken during the previous days will be presented and discussed. A focus will be on identifying opportunities for south-south exchanges among REDD+ countries.
