

Why Social Inclusion is Important to the FCPF

- Social inclusion goes to the heart of most everything we do
 - Manifested not only in FCPF governance structure, but also in multiple FCPF-related processes, products, and guidance statements
- Social inclusion is essential for ensuring environmental and social sustainability of REDD+ and managing risks effectively
- Social inclusion is made possible by three cross-cutting themes in REDD+ Readiness:
 - Consultation and Participation (C&P)
 - Strategic Environmental and Social Assessment (SESA)
 - Feedback and Grievance Redress Mechanisms (FGRM)

Social Inclusion and the FCPF Common Approach

- The FCPF Common Approach to Environmental and Social Safeguards for Multiple Delivery Partners consists of the following:
 - Social/environmental sustainability standards, whether or not they are part of a coherent safeguard policy framework
 - SESA/ESMF, as described in the Common Approach document and in the Guidelines for the Development of ESMF Terms of Reference
 - Stakeholder engagement, as described in the FCPF/UN-REDD
 Guidelines on Stakeholder Engagement in REDD+ Readiness
 - Information dissemination, as described in the FCPF Guidelines on the Disclosure of Information
 - Dispute resolution and prevention, as described in the forthcoming UNDP/World Bank Guidance Note on Strengthening Feedback and Grievance Redress Mechanisms for REDD+
 - MDP-specific accountability mechanisms

Consultation and Participation (C&P)

- Consultation and Participation is the most crosscutting of all three themes
- C&P is relevant for all phases of REDD+, but is especially important in Readiness Preparation
 - Getting things off on the right foot
- When C&P is managed badly (or if it is ignored), all kind of trouble ensues
- When C&P is managed well, there may still be some trouble, but you will see progress towards Readiness

Strategic Environmental and Social Assessment (SESA)

- Through the iterative combination of analytical work and consultation, SESA integrates social and environmental considerations into the preparation of the REDD+ strategy
- SESA and, in particular, the Environmental and Social Management Framework (ESMF) also provides for compliance with relevant REDD+ safeguards
 - Linking back to effective risk management for REDD+
- In Readiness, it is best to start off with a well-structured C&P process, and to situate SESA preparatory activities within that
- However, the SESA itself can lend structure to the process, or can help to reorient or otherwise improve a process that has gotten off track

Feedback and Grievance Redress Mechanisms (FGRM)

Why an FGRM?

- Identify and address potential negative impacts and unanticipated issues
- Prevent escalation of conflicts
- Enhance results and generate lessons learned

What do FGRM for REDD+ provide?

- a means for addressing and managing social tensions and conflict
- a way to build greater trust among relevant stakeholders and foster accountability
- a means to generate information that can be used to enhance the performance of the FCPF grant and related REDD+ Readiness activities

Comparing the Basics

C&P	SESA/ ESMF	FGRMs
<u>WHAT:</u> A multi-stage process involving all relevant stakeholders	<u>WHAT:</u> A multi-stage process that combines analytical work with consultations involving multiple stakeholders	WHAT: A system for receiving and facilitating resolution of complaints and grievances from stakeholders in relation to REDD+ activities in a country
<u>PRODUCTS:</u> Initially, a Consultation & Participation Plan ; eventually, all major outputs of the Readiness Preparation process (REDD+ implementation arrangements, national REDD+ strategy, Reference Level, MRV, etc.), better designed and more sustainable	PRODUCTS: Initially, a SESA ToR and/or Work Plan. Generates several reports, studies, workshop summaries, etc. along the way, but ultimately yields two main products: 1) a refined national REDD+ strategy; 2) an ESMF.	PRODUCTS: A functioning FGRM
TIMING: A detailed C&P Plan, for application during the R-PP implementation stage, should be in place by the middle to the end of the R-PP formulation stage	TIMING: The process should start toward the end of the R-PP formulation stage; it lasts through most or all of the R-PP implementation stage	TIMING: Its development should start during the R-PP formulation stage, so that it can be ready for application "early" in the R-PP implementation stage
GUIDANCE: Joint Stakeholder Engagement Guidelines; R-PP template v. 6, components 1b. and 1c.	<u>GUIDANCE:</u> SESA steps diagram; R-PP template v. 6, components 2a. and 2d.	GUIDANCE: GRM Manual; R-PP template v. 6, component 1a.
