Reporting schedule: It is expected that the annual progress country reporting will be submitted to the FMT by August 15th each year. The reporting should be based on a self-assessment of progress. An update of this country reporting will also be submitted by March 15th each year.

SUMMARY:

With the first FCPF grant we support the participatory process of formulation and validation of the National Strategy on Climate Change and Vegetation Resources (ENCCRV). It included 15 Regional Workshops of national level with 1,266 participants, 1 National Workshop with 125 attendants, in addition to an Indigenous Dialogue and Consultation Process with 1,813 attendants, citizen consultation with 506 participants and finally a self-assessment in line with the R-Package with 74 participants.

On the other hand, we conducted the following Studies for strengthening the formulation of the ENCCRV.

- Support in generating and analyzing the causes of deforestation, forest degradation and no increase in forest carbon stocks, identifying strategic options for addressing them in the framework of Chile's ENCCRV.
- Development of a Study containing an analysis of the technical and legal elements and procedures required for the formulation and future implementation of a Carbon Reduction Rights Transfer and Benefit-Sharing System associated to Payment for Environmental Services

(PES) focused on carbon, within the framework of the ENCCRV and headed by the National Forestry Corporation (CONAF).

- *Support in creating technical, political and strategic inputs for incorporating key elements on management and PES schemes developed under the ENCCRV -and headed by CONAF- into the new Forestry Development Act Project and other regulatory and sectoral promotion instruments.*
- *Support in creating a diagnosis of the media, standards and stakeholders engaged in national-level firewood marketing as a way to contribute to forest degradation reduction within the framework of the ENCCRV.*
- *Designing and collecting key information for addressing causes of deforestation and forest degradation due to unsustainable use of biomass through extension and commercial facilitation, promoting its sustainable use in vulnerable rural and urban populations as mitigation measure of the ENCCRV.*

In addition, with this grant we trained and strengthened institutional capacities through the following courses:

- *Development of a study program -conducive to a Master's Degree- in climate change and vegetation resources taught by Professional Training Center(s) accredited by the Chilean government within the framework of Chile's ENCCRV.*
- *Auditor preparation and course for validating and verifying forest carbon and other environmental services' initiatives.*
- *Training Program on Chile's National Greenhouse Gas Inventories and their links with the Carbon Reference Levels associated to REDD+, for public officials and professionals linked to these topics.*

Describe how stakeholders are participating and engaging in REDD+ decision making processes (FCPF M&E Framework Indicator I.3.A):

As previously mentioned, the formulation and validation process included the active participation of IPs, CSOs, in addition to women engagement. In SESA workshops, 37% of a total of 1,266 individuals were women and 9% were indigenous peoples; in addition, 1,813 attendants participated in the Indigenous Dialogue and Consultation Process.

It is worth noting that the ENCCRV's governance structure will always have a national and regional level socialization and an input collection component with key stakeholders.













4. ISSUES, CHALLENGES AND RISKS

The major issue associated with the first FCPF grant is at a management level, where it was complicated to begin with the contracting and disbursement processes due to the team's lack of experience, which was exceeded due to institutional capacity strengthening generated with the fund's resources.

We currently have previous experience with receiving and executing grants, therefore in this second grant we have been able to create a specific plan of the steps to be followed for efficiently and effectively implementing resources, thus bridging the existing gaps, which will strengthen the ENCCRV in its different stages.

5. MAIN LESSONS LEARNED

The learned lessons are divided into subject areas:

1. **Participatory Formulation Processes:** due to the guidelines established by the grant, a highly participative process was conducted with key stakeholders from all across Chile's regions. This was established as a national-level historic challenge due to the fact that currently, it is mandatory for generated public policies to be participatory; therefore, the formulation and validation of the ENCCRV was established. This process was differentiated as a real participatory process with stakeholders from IPs, CSOs, NGOs, Academy, Landowners, Women and Young People, Consultants, Representatives of the Private and Public Sector -and not only from the forest sector, but from those related with Chile's vegetation resources- all

of which conducted a process of almost two years from the formulation to the culmination of the ENNCRV, with a binding process throughout all of its stages.

2. Technical formulation process: the main lessons learned are related with the capacity established by leading team of specifically guiding and directing each one of the requests or base studies to be implemented, since the initially-stated objectives and goals may be confused due to the lack of previous background in various fields for guiding the tasks. It is worth noting that this process will help other countries develop their strategies in a rapid manner, since they will already have knowledge of the previous experiences.
